

REPORT ON OPERATIONS 2023 - TRACEY RUSNAK, EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

2023 was another eventful year at Cameray. Highlights of the year for the agency include:

- Settling into our beautiful new space at the Celeste Redman Community Resource Centre on Rosser Avenue.
- Successful re-accreditation with Council on Accreditation with no recommendations!
- Nomination and award of a substantial grant from Allan and Gill Gray Foundation, allowing us to significantly increase programming and administrative infrastructure.
- Receipt of a new Sexual Assault Services contract through the Ministry of Public Safety and Solicitor General.
- All staff completed San'yas Indigenous Cultural Safety training.
- Engaging a new IT consultant (Tavanca) and embarking on a full technology overhaul to increase security.
- Implementing a Parent Education Program for parents of school-aged children.
- Expanding ACTS program into five new schools.
- Retaining a consultant to conduct a full Equity, Diversity and Inclusion audit of the agency, funded by a Community Services Recovery Fund grant through the Canadian Red Cross.
- Holding our tenth annual fundraiser workshop: "Sexual Health, Development and Concerns in Children: Building Your Toolbox".
- Recruitment of a Fund Development and Communications Coordinator for 2024.
- Succession planning for hiring a new Executive Director in 2024.

On a personal note, as I prepare for my upcoming retirement, I have been reflecting on the impact Cameray has had on my own life, as well as the communities of Burnaby and New Westminster. It has been such an honour to be part of this amazing organization, which does so much to support so many families. My experience over the past thirty years at Cameray has shaped who I am as a person and as a professional. I would like to thank the wonderful staff and Board for their hard work and dedication to the agency and to the people we serve. There is something magical about Cameray, and this is because of the people who make it up. Thank you for all you have given me, and I look forward to seeing how the agency continues to grow and change and positively impact so many lives.

PERFORMANCE AND QUALITY IMPROVEMENT (PQI) PROCESS - 2023

Cameray Child and Family Services is committed to providing quality services, which is accomplished through our Performance and Quality Improvement (PQI) Plan.

Our priorities are:

investing in people, serving our clients, engaging with community, and advancing equity.

The PQI process includes ongoing collection, monitoring, and analysis of data in order to confirm that all programs and services are functioning at their optimal level. If any issues or problems are discovered through the PQI process, plans for improvement are created, implemented, and monitored. There is a continuous feedback loop of data reporting and analysis, improvement plans, and evaluation of changes made.



PQI efforts in 2023 were successful in:

- **Expanding our programs** through new grants and contracts, including doubling the capacity of our ACTS program, implementing a new Parent Education Program, and securing ongoing funding for our Emergency Sexual Assault Services program.
- Advancing justice, equity, diversity, inclusion, and decolonization efforts through the establishment of the Creating Change Initiative and the commencement of a full agency EDI audit. In addition, all staff and Board were provided with San'yas Indigenous Cultural Safety training.
- Improving personnel wellbeing and satisfaction, as evidenced by the results of our annual personnel satisfaction survey.
- **Reducing the waitlis**t in the counselling program by one month, to bring us to a total of a three month reduction over the past two years.

Other priorities moving forward:

- Further reducing the waitlist in the counselling program.
- Continue diversity and equity work in the organization.
- Supporting the staff and programs through leadership transition.

PARENTING SUPPORT PROGRAM	This program began as a Building Blocks project in 1997 and was restructured over the years. The current program offers prevention and early intervention services to both parents of young children and parents-to-be that strengthen family resiliency. They are offered as individual parent support sessions as well as interactive and psycho-educational groups. This program is funded by the Ministry of Children and Family Development.	518 TOTAL SEEN 437.5 TOTAL GROUP HOURS
EARLY YEARS PROGRAM	This program began in 2019 and is funded by the Ministry of Children and Family Development to provide services to support the well-being of children ages 0-6 and their families, as defined by the Early Years Framework. Cameray holds the contract as the lead agency in Burnaby for these services, and subcontracts to several partner agencies including: Burnaby Neighbourhood House, S.U.C.C.E.S.S., Burnaby Family Life, Information Children, and MOSAIC. The services Cameray provides include both outreach as well as evening interactive and psychoeducational groups. Partner agencies provide complementary services such as outreach and navigation services, as well as family drop-ins. EMERGENCY SEXUAL ASSAULT SERVICES This program began in 2021 and was initially funded by the Ending Violence Association of B.C. (EVA). The program provides victim support and clinical counselling for individuals who are victims of sexual assault. In 2023 the EVA funding ended, but the program continued with new funding from the Ministry of Public Safety and Solicitor General.






CLIENTS SERVED IN 2023

COUNSELLING PROGRAM BREAKDOWN





MEASUREMENT OF CONSUMER SATISFACTION

Evaluation forms are used in each program to obtain feedback from all consumers (adults, youth and children) and to assess all levels of the client's experience at Cameray from the time of the referral to termination. The results of these forms are tallied into reports and have been very positive. High percentages of the clients were pleased with the service they received from Cameray. Any areas that clients reported as being a concern or needing improvement were discussed and, wherever appropriate, improvement plans were made.
